<p><b>WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE A VICTIM OF A CRIME ON BOARD A SHIP</b></p> <p>After any crime including sexual assault and rape, it is very important that the crime scene be preserved.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. It should be sealed off until law enforcement arrives.</li> <li>2. Pictures should be taken of the entire scene.</li> <li>3. Access to the scene should be limited to law enforcement personnel who know how to collect evidence without destroying it.</li> <li>4. Gloves and booties should be worn.</li> <li>5. The names, addresses and telephone numbers of each possible witness should be obtained and statements taken.</li> <li>6. The sexual assault or rape victim should be instructed not to eat, drink, shower, bath, brush teeth or go to the bathroom before a rape exam is done by a physician.</li> <li>7. <p><b>STEPS TO TAKE IF YOU ARE INJURED ON BOARD A SHIP</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Immediately report in writing the incident to the security department on the ship.</li> <li>2. Get a copy of your written report.</li> <li>3. Take photographs of the scene of the incident before it changes, if possible. If the scene has changed, still take photographs.</li> <li>4. Write down the name, address, and telephone number of each person who is a witness to the incident.</li> <li>5. Go to the ship's doctor to get treatment for your injury.</li> <li>6. If necessary, go to a shore side doctor at the next port of call.</li> <li>7. Contact an experienced maritime attorney to discuss the incident as soon as possible.</li> </ol>	<p><b>Keep this card with you at all times in case of emergency or accident while you are on board a ship. Relying on the shipping company to do the right thing is not a good idea.</b></p> <p><b>F.B.I.: (202) 324-3000</b> Contact the F.B.I. immediately if you have been victim of a crime on board such as rape or sexual assault, or if you believe someone is missing from the ship.</p> <p><b>United States Coast Guard: (757) 398-6390</b> Contact the Coast Guard if you believe someone is missing from the ship, someone has gone overboard, or if there is a fire on board.</p> <p><b>Maritime Lawyers: (305) 373-3016</b> on board for advice on steps you should take and how to protect your rights. 24/7 free consultation from the high seas.
